IMPACT: DELIBERATING SYSTEMIC ISSUES

Program Overview







Starting in October 2022, Close Up and the National Network of Schools in Partnership will offer *IMPACT*: *Deliberating Systemic Issues*. Through this virtual program, high school students will develop a deeper understanding of complex policy challenges facing the nation, connect those issues to longstanding values and tensions, and gain a rich understanding of the value of deliberation in a democracy. Students will examine major policy issues, evaluate proposals that represent a range of viewpoints, and consider, as a group, how to best address these issues. After developing a better understanding of their own values and priorities, students will participate in a training to develop the facilitation skills to lead controversial issue discussions in their own school communities.

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Program Syllabus







Session 1: Introduction to the Program and Community Building

During the first session, students will review the goals of the program and work to create community. Students will develop community guidelines to ensure that they are able to work together successfully and productively. They will also form community by sharing the experiences, people, and/or events that have shaped their ideas about politics through the creation of a community timeline. Students will consider how their own experiences connect to broader political, social, and economic issues.

Session 2: Understanding Political Values -

Students will learn how competing values and goals animate American public policy deliberations and begin to understand why it is so difficult for the public to reach agreement. They will identify and begin to evaluate values that are frequently in tension in U.S. political debates and analyze laws on the basis of the values being prioritized.

Session 3: Exploring Multiple Perspectives on an Issue -

Students will learn about a controversial issue through a mixture of short videos, a prepared resource, and guided small group discussions that connect their own experiences and communities to the larger national issue. Students will develop initial ideas for addressing the issue and then craft questions for the policy expert panel in Session 4. Finally, students will engage in a minideliberation to prioritize the questions for the panel.

Session 4: Policy Expert Panel -

Students will engage with a panel of experts who each represent a different political or ideological perspective. Students' questions will drive the panel and allow students to explore the various approaches to solving this issue represented by the differing perspectives.

Session 5: Issue Deliberation -

Students will be guided in a deliberation that synthesizes their learning and discussions from the previous two sessions in order to reach a consensus about how best to address the issue. Students in each workshop will share their proposals with the whole program, and students will reflect together on the challenges of deliberation and consensus building.

Session 6: Student Facilitation and Program Reflection -

Students will receive training on the skill of discussion facilitation. The goal of the session is for students to learn how to be facilitators so they can go back to their schools to lead an issue deliberation. Students will receive a handbook for student facilitators, resources to guide a deliberation about the program issue, and guidance for setting up a deliberation in their school or community. Finally, students will reflect on the program as a whole and learn about future opportunities to engage in deliberation with Close Up.
